Based Allocation Report is the total funds and staff salaries for our school. We are allocated \$10,810,87, this funding comprises of \$8,260,604 for staffing and \$638,365 is total operation funding. I am sure you are well aware of the increase in funding for private schools we do not have this luxury but I am sure we will be able to run all the classes and projects to fulfil our school plan.

Study Periods

As Year 11 students begin to amend their patterns of study, it is likely they will have study periods (no allocated class) appear in their timetable. It is essential that students use these periods productively to maximise their performance in the HSC. During these times, students are able to access the library or they are able to be in the outdoor senior COLA. Students are not to disturb the learning of other classes. All students must be at school from the beginning of the day until the final bell – there are no flexible timetables until next year.

School Ambassadors in the Community

Students are reminded that during their travel to and from school, they are ambassadors for our school. Please be mindful of the local residents during these times whether you are a pedestrian or travelling in a vehicle. Recently we have had some reports of students who are not conducting themselves respectfully, particularly on Monday and Tuesday when students of MHS are making their way to the local Primary schools to pick up siblings. 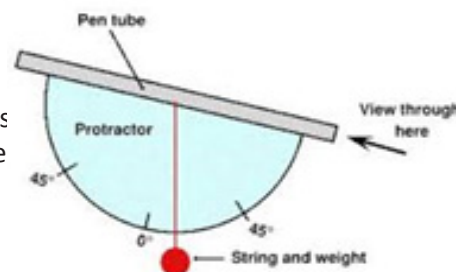

Maths

We would like to congratulate our Year 12 of 2018 for completing their HSC examinations. We wish them the best for their results and look forward to hearing from them when the results are released.

The Australian Mathematics Competition results are in. This year we had 77 students participate in the competition.

Akanksha Ponaboina (year 7) and Ayesha Baig (year 8) were two students who achieved Distinctions. In addition, 20 students achieved Credits, 47 students achieved proficiency and there were 8 participations. Well done to everyone who participated this year, and thank you to Mr Hafiz for organising the competition.



The top year 8 classes participated in the Maths Olympiad this year. 8M1 and 8M2 participated in problem solving tests. Augustus Amedume and Luka Golub both achieved results in the top 20%. Well done to both classes.

New style of assessment in the Year 12 Standard Math courses

This week our year 12 Standard Maths classes are completing their first HSC assessment tasks for the new syllabuses. NESA's focus on utilising technology and real situations has our teachers redesigning assessment tasks with a hands on approach.

Mr Lam's class made Clinometers from cardboard, string and drinking straws, which allowed them to measure the angle of elevation of objects in the playground.

The Standard 2 classes are using a combination of Google Earth and Geogebra to measure the area and perimeter of Mitchell High School. This is just a taste of the new style of assessment that will have our students putting their technical and practical Math skills to the test.

We would also, like to take this opportunity to wish every student good luck in their end of year examinations.

A reminder that the mathematics department offers free tutoring sessions at school every Wednesday and Thursday afternoon. We encourage all students who feel they need extra help to attend.

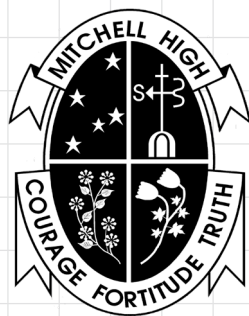

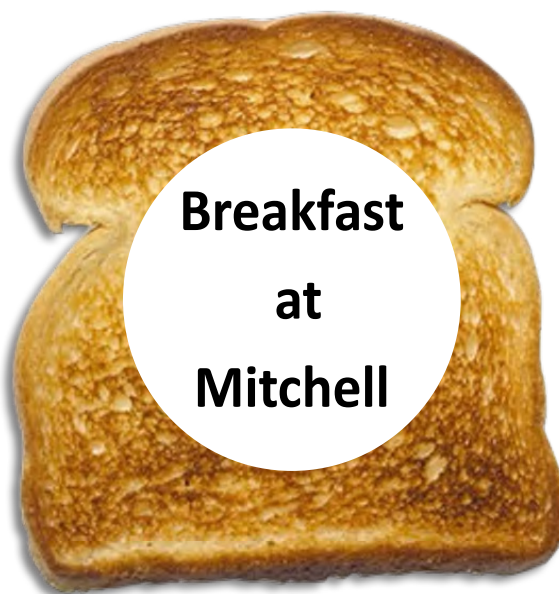
