Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute Science Award 2022

The Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute Science Award is one of Australia's pre-eminent research organisations with both a national and international reputation for excellence in biomedical research and training. To foster and encourage interest in science and a career in science, which requires the highest levels of educational achievement, innovation, creativity and hard work, the Institute has established a Science Award to recognise the efforts and achievements of Year 11 Australian Secondary School Students.

Victor Chang was an outstanding cardiothoracic surgeon in Australia and South-East Asia, and one of the leading heart surgeons in the world. He pioneered the future of cardiothoracic surgery and research in Australia. He was responsible for developing Australia's National Heart Transplant Programme and, at the time of his death, was working on the development of an artificial heart valve, which would be used to support seriously ill patients who were awaiting heart transplants.

Victor Chang nurtured a vision to establish an internationally-recognised cardiac research centre at St Vincent's. With his tragic and untimely death in 1991 efforts to realise Victor's dream accelerated resulting in generous donations which enabled the establishment of The Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute (VCCRI).

It gives me great pleasure to announce that this year's recipient of the Victor Chang Award goes to — **Sam Dryden.** The presentation of the award took place on Tuesday 1/11/22 at Blacktown City Council at 4pm. School Principal Ms Elena Marinis and Mrs Ebony Larrea (Physics Teacher) attended the ceremony.

She taught the following subjects in her career: French Beginners and Continuers, German Beginners and Continuers, Italian and Japanese.

Mrs Larkin has also had the following roles of responsibility over the years:

- Nirimba Learning Group Coordinator for many years providing quality workshops to support staff from 9 schools with their teaching practice.
- Founding member of the Language Teacher Network for the Blue Mountains/ Penrith area and Parramatta/ Blacktown area.
- Group Coordinator for the Western Sydney Region-Languages Network.
- Subject Coordinator at Mitchell High School for a number of years.
- HSC Marker, Judge and Senior Judge for a number of years.

Mrs Larkin was an exceptional Languages teacher at MHS. I really enjoyed (and felt privileged) observing her lessons from time to time. Her lessons were always engaging even I learned a thing or two – I would have loved to have been a student in her class, learning a second language. She has had exceptional success in the HSC, helping many of her students achieve band 6's. Over the years, French beginners has regularly achieved band 6's, making it one of the best performing subjects at Mitchell High.

She was and has always been a great asset to the school. I always believed that Universities should model how she taught her lessons to beginning Languages teachers - to show them the teaching standard that is required when teaching Languages. We, both the staff and students were very lucky to have had such a wonderful, caring, committed and knowledgeable teacher for so many years. We will miss her.




Senior Hospitality Day

STUDENT MOBILE PHONE PROCEDURES

Purpose

Mitchell High School acknowledges the educational value of digital devices and online services in supporting and enhancing educational outcomes and student wellbeing. We also recognise they may cause harm if used inappropriately and that we need to support our students to use them in safe, responsible and respectful ways.

Scope

Mobile phones are not to be used during school hours. At the beginning of the school year, every student will be assigned a personal **Yondr Pouch with an ID Number**, similar to being assigned a textbook. This will be recorded through the school library. While the Yondr Pouch is considered school property, it is each student's responsibility to bring their pouch with them to school every day.

Process

As students enter the building for roll call, they will:

- 1. Turn their mobile phone off.
- 2. Place their mobile phone inside the pouch, place it on their desk for the roll call teacher to view the phone inside, close it securely.
- 3. Place the Yondr pouch into their school bag where it will remain all day.

Each student will maintain possession of their mobile phone inside their Yondr Pouch for the duration of the school day. Late students will complete this process at the Attendance Office as they sign in.

Exit: As students exit the school at the end of the school day, they will:

- 1. Unlock their pouch using an Unlocking Base at the school exits.
- 2. Remove their mobile phone from their pouch.
- 3. Close their empty pouch securely and place it in their school bag for the next day.

(Exception: excused early leavers whereby the student will unlock their pouch at the Front Office)

Violations

Below is a list of potential student violations. Each of these violations will result in the student's device/mobile phone and/or pouch being confiscated by school staff.

- 1. Physical damage to the pouch in an attempt to circumvent its intended purpose. (Examples: discoloration, pen marks, bent pin or stripped lock inside the pouch).
- 2. Forgetting or losing the pouch student will need to bring mobile phone to the Deputy Principal's Office.
- 3. Using their mobile phone during school hours.
- 4. Other devices, such as laptops, tablets, headphones and smartwatches, pose similar challenges and opportunities. These devices can be linked to mobile phones and therefore the same policy applies to these actions.



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Disciplinary Action if a Yondr Pouch is Damaged

- 5. Mobile phone and Pouch will be confiscated and parent/carer will be notified immediately.
- 6. Student's parent/carer must come to the school to pick up their child's mobile phone and a replacement pouch may be assigned.
- 7. Formal Caution to Suspend for damage to school property.
- 8. Deputy Principal will notify the library. The library will invoice student and parents via email and/or phone call for replacement Yondr Pouch.
- 9. The student will only be allowed to bring a mobile phone back to school if they or their parent/carer pay a \$20 fee to replace the damaged school property.

Contact Between Students and Parent/Carer(s) During the School Day

Should a student need to make a phone call during the school day, they must:

- approach the Front Office and ask for permission to use the school's phone; or
- ask SASS staff for permission to unlock their mobile phone, make a phone call and then lock the Yondr Pouch again. Storing the mobile phone again must be supervised by SASS staff.

During school hours, parents/ carers are expected to only contact their children via the school front office. A message will then be sent to the student.

Responsibilities and Obligations

For students

- Be safe, responsible and respectful users of mobile phones and online services, and support their peers to be the same.
- Respect and follow school rules and procedures and the decisions made by staff, knowing that other schools may have different arrangements.
- Communicate respectfully and collaboratively with peers, school staff and the school community and behave in the ways described in the Behaviour Code for Students.

For parents/carers

- Recognise the role they play in educating their children and modelling the behaviours that underpin the safe, responsible and respectful use of digital devices and online services.
- Support implementation of the school procedure, including its approach to resolving issues.
- Take responsibility for their child's use of digital devices and online services at home, such as use of online services with age and content restrictions.
- Communicate with school staff and the school community respectfully and collaboratively as outlined in the <u>School Community Charter</u>.
- Switch off or put their digital devices on silent when at official school functions and during meetings.
- Provide digital devices that meet school specifications where a school is participating in a Bring Your
 Own Device program and complete any related paperwork consistent with the agreement.

Communicating this Procedure to the School Community

Recommended inclusions are listed below.

Students will be informed about this procedure through email, the School Website, and School Facebook page.

Parent/carer(s) will be advised via email and the School Facebook page. This procedure can be accessed electronically via the School's Website.



Reminder to parents and carers to apply now for 2023 School Opal cards

Getting to school by bus in 2023

Will your child be catching the bus to school in 2023? Applications are now open for a School Opal cards. As it's a busy time of year, we highly recommend you make this application before the end of Term 4. It's also good to check the bus timetable to make your child's journey to school as easy as possible.

Here is how it works:

School Opal cards

All students catching the bus in 2023 will need a School Opal card.

Under the School Student Transport Scheme, eligible students can apply for free or subsided travel between home and school.

For more information about the School Student Transport Scheme and how to apply for a School Opal Card, visit https://apps.transport.nsw.gov.au/ssts/#/ from a desktop computer, and click 'apply for a school travel pass'. Applications for 2023 opened at the start of Term 4.

Bus timetables

Busways is the school bus operator that runs your schools' bus services. To find your child's school bus timetable visit the Busways website by using the following steps:

- 1. Go to busways.com.au/nsw
- 2. Click on 'school services' in the navigation bar and then proceed to 'school timetables'
- 3. Enter the school's name in the field that says 'enter a school name'
- 4. Select the school's name and the timetable should open on your device.

(If you are unable to find or search for the school's name, use the drop-down menus on the same web page to find the school).

5. Once the timetable is opened, you will be able to identify which school bus services are available in your area for your child to use.
